Minimum monthly allowance provided by partner companies: TWD 32,000 from Gelang Restaurant Co., Ltd., TWD 33,000 from Kanpai Co., Ltd. Internship Locations and Position Availability: (1) Kanpai Co., Ltd. provides 20 positions. (2) Gelang Restaurant Co., Ltd. also provides 20 positions. |
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| Work-study During Semester Employment Counseling | Students who wish to work in Taiwan (either on campus or off campus) are required to apply for and obtain a work permit before starting a job. With the exception of the winter and summer vacations, students' total working hours shall not exceed 20 hours per week. 1. The university's Counseling and Career Development Center offers employment consultation services. 2. Retention mechanisms are available within each internship organization to encourage students to remain with the company post-graduation. |
| Further Education After Graduation | After completing their studies and obtaining a bachelor's degree, students can pursue further education to earn a master's degree in programs such as the Graduate Institute of Gerontology Service Management or the Graduate Institute of Business Administration. Students can also apply for the relevant master's program at overseas partner universities or any other universities(*) such as: Tarumanagara University (Indonesia), Fukuoka Institute of Technology (Japan), Tunku Abdul Rahman University (Malaysia), Adamson University (Philippines), Nanyang Polytechnic (Singapore), Montana Technological University (United States), Western Sydney University (Australia), and Rotterdam University of Applied Sciences (Netherlands) (*) Sister Schools List: https://shorturl.at/jWOkS |
| Scholarships and Financial Aids | The OCAC provides the following grants and subsidies: The first two years of tuition grant: each new student will be granted TWD 20,000 per semester during the first two academic years. Excellent Conduct and Academic Performance Scholarship: Available for those with excellent academic performance. Those who have obtained certificates and competition awards will be awarded TWD 6,000 per person per academic year. Medical Insurance for Overseas Compatriot Students (6 months): A total of TWD 600 will be subsidized (before students enroll in National Health Insurance). Healthcare: Every student is required to enroll in National Health Insurance and pay the insurance premiums. Students who have proof of economic hardship (or |

- financial difficulty document) are subsidized 50 % of the insurance premiums. (Current monthly subsidy is TWD 413).
- (5) Work-study subsidy and economic hardship scholarship: TWD 2,500 per month for students who are offered work-study opportunities.
- (6) Emergency Aid: Provided on a case-by-case basis.
- 2. Scholarship and subsidies provided by the University:
- (1) Accommodation Subsidy: Full accommodation subsidy for the first semester (students must prepay for air conditioning, cleaning, and security deposits).
- (2) Tuition Subsidy: TWD 20,000 per semester for the first year. For the second to fourth years, subsidies range from TWD 5,000 to TWD 20,000 per semester based on the student's class rank and the scholarship budget of the school for that year.
